ENDING THE HIV EPIDEMIC FUNDING AWARDED TO WAYNE STATE UNIVERSITY PREVENTION (W'SUP)

Angulique Outlaw, PhD, Associate Professor and the Wayne State University

Prevention (W'SUP) team have been

awarded \$100,000 in Ending

the HIV Epidemic funding (CDC -flow down via the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services) to develop, promote, and pilot test an in-home rapid HIV testing program for high risk individuals ages 18 to 34 in the city of Detroit and Wayne County.

The project will be managed by Monique Green-Jones, MPH

and W'SUP Project Manager and will be promoted on social media platforms and participants will work, virtually, with an HIV test counselor during in-home testing and the follow-up process



(prevention or treatment planning). The project will officially launch on November 1, 2020 and will be implemented for one year. The project will serve as a pilot for a larger multi-site project involving in-home rapid HIV testing for adolescents and young adults.

In other news, on August 24, Dr. Outlaw was a presenter in the second of a four part series webinar organized by The Effi Barry Training Institute. Dr. Outlaw's presentation was titled *How to: Building and Conducting Community Based Participatory Research*.

The series invites participants to deep-dive into strategies and theories behind community engaged work with populations affected by HIV. The series introduces participants to the nuance of community engagement and cultural humility, provides concrete examples of guiding princi-

ples for Community Based Participatory Research (CBPR), and guides participants in implementing the results of CBPR in authentic and sustainable ways. The webinar encourages participants and organizations to explore ways to re-focus on community members as key partners and decision-makers, and to collaborate and innovate effectively with stakeholders while prioritizing them each step of the way. Dr. Outlaw's session: 1) discussed the rationale for a CBPR approach in public health research; 2) explained the process and challenges of forming and maintaining CBPR partnerships; 3) gave participants the importance of CBPR partnerships in the dissemination of research findings and community change; and 4) taught them how CBPR practices can be applied to community engagement in HIV prevention, care, and treatment programs.

Jinping Xu, MD, a Professor in DFMPHS, has received approval on her proposal for an enhancement to her existing PCORI award 14467-WSU. The Project Title is: Best Practices to Engage Black Men in the Development of a Cancer Health Equity Research Agenda.



Julie Gleason-Comstock, PhD, MCHES, became a Fellow in the North American Primary Care Research Group (NAPCRG) Grant Gener-

ating Project (GGP) with a NAPCRG peer-reviewed proposal titled "Achieving Blood Pressure Control Through Patient Engagement in Cardiovascular Health." Building on her previous research, the proposed randomized controlled study will seek to demonstrate that an intervention using the Health Belief Model and com-



munity participatory research methodology can improve blood pressure control for urban African-American adults. The NAPCRG GGP Fellowship serves

as a foundation for submission of a NHLBI grant. With **Dr. Victoria Neale** as her Mentor, Dr. Gleason joined Fellows from the United States and Canada graduating in August, 2020.

MI-AHEC RECEIVES CARES ACT FUNDING TO COMBAT COVID-19

In June 2020, Michigan AHEC received over \$95,000 in CARES Act funding from HRSA (Health Resources and Services Administration). The funds are being used to enhance the infrastructure of three FQHCs (Federally Qualified Health Care Centers) in Michigan and an academic training program on best practices to prevent, prepare and respond in the delivery of telehealth services to limit the spread of COVID-19.

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, it has become clear that telehealth services are a critical means of delivering health care services. The CARES Act funds helps to provide technical support to the FQHCs and enhanced their readiness to respond to COVID-19 through telehealth technologies. The funds also helped prepare and train clinicians and students on the delivery of telehealth.

"We are very pleased to be able to use these funds to help train clinicians, students and staff who are serving vulnerable rural and urban populations throughout Michigan," said **Dr. Tsveti Markova**, Co-Principal Investigator of Michigan AHEC, Chair and Professor in the Department of Family Medicine and Public Health Sciences and Senior Associate Dean for Graduate Medical Education in the Wayne State University School of Medicine.



"The training and education we are providing is truly interdisciplinary," said **Dr. Ramona Benkert**, Co-Principal Investigator of Michigan

AHEC, Associate Dean of Academic and Clinical Affairs, and Associate Professor, Wayne State University College of Nursing. "The curriculum was developed by WSU College of Nursing and WSU School of Medicine faculty and the training was conducted by an interdisciplinary group of both students and clinicians."



The CARES act fund will be applied during Fiscal Year 2020/2021. The grant partners include two HRSA grantees: Michigan AHEC and NEPQR-BSN-PC (*Nurse Education, Practice, Quality and Retention*) Program in the WSU College of Nursing. The FQHC partners include clinics in the Upper Peninsula, Mid-Michigan and Detroit.

CLASS OF 2017'S DR. JAWAN GORGIS IS FAMILY MEDICINE RESIDENT OF THE YEAR

Wayne State University School of Medicine alumna Jawan Gorgis, MD, was named by the Michigan Academy of Family Physicians as one of only two Michigan Family Medicine Residents of the Year.

She was elected the school's national representative to the American Medical Association, and participated in the comprehensive Fabric of Society and Medical Political Action Committee Co-Curricular program, volunteering 150 hours in multiple community organizations, clinics and lobbying efforts. She obtained certification as an HIV counselor. She also was involved with multiple research studies resulting in a publication on her diabetes project. Her work with Street Medicine Detroit resulted in two posters she presented at national conferences.

PHILANTHROPIC SUPPORT FOR FAMILY MEDICINE DOCTOR RETENTION IN MICHIGAN

During the 2019-20 academic year, the WSU Department of Family Medicine and Public Health Sciences was very fortunate to partner with an anonymous donor to create the Bonnie Simmons-Sherr, MD scholarship award. Dr. Bonnie Simmons-Sherr practiced Family Medicine for nearly 20 years before her untimely death in 2009. She was deeply committed to addressing healthcare disparities and spent her entire career providing care to underserved vulnerable populations. This award was created to encourage graduating residents from the WSU Family Medicine Residency Program to practice in underserved communities in Michigan carrying on the legacy of Dr. Simmons-Sherr.

A selection committee led by the Family Medicine Residency Program Director was formed comprised of WSU Department of Family Medicine and Public Health faculty. This committee is responsible for adhering to established guidelines and protocols for candidate selection based on

specific inclusion criteria. The amount of the award is up to \$25,000 annually which will be adjusted based upon the number of recipients selected during the academic year. Upon graduation, the selected resident must have a signed contract to practice in a designated Health Profession Shortage area (HPSA) in the state of Michigan.

This year's recipient is **Dr. Philip Riley**, a graduate of Marshall University School of Medicine in West Virginia. During his three years in our Family Medicine Program, Dr. Riley distinguished himself as an outstanding resident, one of the best in his class, who displayed a strong interest addressing healthcare disparities with the goal of practicing in an underserved area upon graduation. Dr. Riley is now working in Brooklyn, Michigan at the Henry Ford Allegiance Family Medicine Center, an officially designated HPSA site.



Dr. Riley stated he is extremely honored and grateful to receive the Bonnie Simmon-Sherr award and looks forward to providing high quality healthcare to populations most in need. Dr. Riley will use these funds to apply towards his large medical school student loan debt and is extremely grateful for this very generous award.

"We are very proud to present the Bonnie Simmon-Sherr Scholarship Award to Dr. Philip Riley, a very deserving and outstanding graduate of the WSU Family Medicine Residency Program class of 2020," said Dr. Tsveti Markova, Department Chair. "Congratulations Dr. Riley!"
