MICHIGAN AHEC LAUNCHES Ahec Scholars Program

This January, Michigan AHEC (Area Health Education Center) launched the AHEC Scholar's

Program at Wayne State University. The AHEC Scholars is a part of a national initiative to prepare tomorrow's health professionals to become leaders in

interprofessional, transformative practice who serve those who need it the most. The inaugural Michigan AHEC Scholars cohort includes 20 nursing and medical students.

Dr. Juliann Binienda, Associate Professor in Wayne State University's School of Medicine is the AHEC Scholars Course Director. "We are excited to offer this statewide innovative and stimulating program which seeks to increase the quantity and quality of health professionals in rural and urban underserved areas of Michigan."

The Michigan AHEC Scholars Program is designed for health professions students from diverse backgrounds who are interested in supplementing their education by gaining additional knowledge and experience in rural or urban

underserved communities. It aims to prepare students to enter the health professions workforce by teaching them health disparities and the role of the community in patient care through interaction with different health specialties. Types of health professions students in the AHEC scholars program are: medical, pharmacy, dental, nursing, physician assistant, public health, and social work.

AHEC Scholars is a 2-year program that requires 80 hours of effort per year. Forty hours will be spent completing clinical and community based training and 40 hours will be spent participating in didactic training activities.

Educational and training activities for AHEC Scholars will be team-based and will support the following areas: Interprofessional Education; Behavioral Health Integration; Social Determinants of Health; Cultural Competency; Practice Transformation, and Current and Emerging Health Issues

In the fall of 2019, the Michigan AHEC Scholars Program is expected to expand and include students from across the state of Michigan.

MICHIGAN AHEC

JOHN P WALLER JR., DRPH AND MENTHELE (MIKKI) WALLER ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED TO MASTER OF PUBLIC HEALTH STUDENT

The John B. Waller Jr., DrPH and Menthele (Mikki) Waller Endowed Scholarship for MPH Students was recently awarded to Tonia Jones, a Master of Public Health student in the Wayne State University Department of Family Medicine and Public Health Sciences.

"I was very excited, happy and honored," Jones said.

Dr. Waller, who established the foundation of the School of Medicine's Master of Public Health program, was considered by many the community face of public health in metropolitan Detroit, serving as Detroit's director of Public Health and chair of the then-Department of Community Medicine. He was one of the nation's first researchers to treat interpersonal violence as a public health issue. His focus on population-based epidemiology also encompassed maternalchild health, chronic and disabling conditions, and health disparities.

At the time of his death in 2006, Dr. Waller was director of the WSU Institute for Maternal and Child Health, director of the WSU Division for the Prevention and Control of Interpersonal Violence, and senior vice president for Urban and Community Health for the Detroit Medical Center/Wayne State University Community Health Institute. He served as a public health professional for more than 40 years.

Jones, an Oak Park native, recently completed her public health practicum portion of the degree, working at The Youth Connection in Detroit, where she created a "Healthy Home" manual for adolescents and young adults aging out of the foster system.

"I really love giving back to the com-

munity, serving the underserved and helping others," she said. She is in the final year of her graduate degree. "It came at the right time. It means a lot to me both financially and as a growing professional to be honored for doing work that I love to do and will continue to do," she added.

Jones was recognized at a Nov. 28 gathering attended by her parents, along with Mrs. Mikki Waller as the honored guest.

Dr. Waller established the Master of Public Health program in the WSU School of Medicine. Before 2016, the first year of the Waller Endowed Scholarship, the Waller family and the Department of Family Medicine and Public Health Sciences provided an annual John B. Waller Student Achievement Award.

"Every year you make me part of this. It makes me feel happy, very happy," Mrs. Waller said. "It just makes me so proud."

The WSU School of Medicine celebration's speakers included Department of Family Medicine and Public Health Sciences Chair and Professor Tsveti Markova, MD, FAAFP; and Herbert Smitherman, MD, MPH, FACP, vice dean of Diversity and Community Affairs.

"Dr. Waller was a rare combination of excellence, caring for people and political savvy," said Dr. Smitherman, his mentee. "The legacy of this award is extremely important." As the MPH program continues to grow, Dr. Markova noted, "We appreciate the generosity of the Waller family and their contribution to the advancement of the values of Detroit urban health."

The next Waller Endowed Scholarship will be awarded in April.

RESEARCHING INTRAFAMILY CONFLICT: MENTAL HEALTH PROBLEMS AND SLEEP DISTURBANCE

Dr. Liying Zhang, a research assistant in DFMPHS, and her coauthors published a peer-reviewed article in Sleep Medicine 46 (2018) 74-80. Mental health problems and sleep disturbance are prevalent in adolescents. Intrafamily conflict has been found to be associated with mental health problems and sleep disturbance in adolescents. Dr. Zhang's study examined the hypothesis that sleep disturbance mediates the effect of intrafamily conflict on mental health problems. They found that sleep disturbance had significant mediating effects on the relationship between intrafamily conflict and mental health problems. The findings suggested that family-centered programs should include sleep disturbance intervention for preventing adolescent mental health problems. 


Fig. 2. Standardized parameter estimates based on the revised model.

PUBLIC HEALTH A PERFECT FIT FOR MPH ALUMNUS

Dr. Shawnita Sealy- Jefferson, MPH (2008), PhD (2012), is an Assistant Professor at the Ohio State Public

College of Public Health where she teaches social epidemiology.

"Who I am at my core makes work in public health a perfect fit for me.



First, I defy odds. I'm an epidemiologist and I calculate odds for a living, but I don't think the odds against me matter. Racial disparity in preterm birth has existed for a long time and it looks like we can't do anything about it, but I don't care what it looks like because I have never paid attention to the odds of whether I can do or try something. Second, I fight injustice. In public health we have a moral imperative to fight for social justice. Third, I believe that God has my back and good will prevail over evil. And fourth, I find and help underdogs. Trying to find solutions for groups that are suffering is my responsibility and a part of who I am."

MD-MPH GRADUATE WINS JOHNS HOPKINS RESEARCH AWARD

Lea Selitsky, MD- MPH, 2018, won the Johns Hopkins University Division of General Internal Medicine Housestaff Research Award, The Richard Moore Award. The award recognizes achievement in HIV-related research. Dr. Selitsky was recognized for research she conducted as a medical and MPH student at WSU, "Associations between traumatic experiences and sexual risk factors among incarcerated adolescents in Detroit."

 Drs. Ralph Williams, Tamara Schmidt (voluntary community faculty), and Juliann Binienda presented a seminar at a national forum: the annual Society of Teachers of Family Medicine (STFM) conference on Medical Student Education in Jacksonville, Florida Jan 31 – Feb 3, 2019. Titled "The Unburdening of Community Preceptors", the lecture described the WSU School of Medicine experience of transitioning a Year 3 clerkship to the Year 2 medical school curriculum. This paradigm shift in medical education involved revising the SOM curriculum, along with the heroic task of recruiting over 100 new community preceptors to accommodate the 300 WSU medical students, and then training the preceptors on how to

enrich the educational experience of these younger students. This session was attended by approximately 40 family medicine faculty from around the nation. The presentation stimulated great discussion and received a standing ovation.


